Putting your Patient at Ease

Good communication with your patient is essential. Imagine the patient is a close family member or
friend and treat him or her as you wish to be treated yourself. Always try to put your patient
at 1 and make them feel 2 If possible, 3 at the same level as the patient.
The expression on your face is important, so ⁴ and maintain ⁵ contact with your
patient. When you talk, don't rush the patient or speak too ⁶ and always use a ⁷ ,
open tone of voice. Take an interest in your patient, use their ⁸ and ask them general
⁹ about their life. It is also important to use an ¹⁰ posture, i.e. don't fold your arms,
as this can look aggressive. Finally, check it is OK to ask ¹¹ and tell them roughly how long

Follow this treatment and most lower back pain will improve:

Smoking and cardiovascular disease

Smoking is a major risk factor for getting cardiovascular (heart and blood vessel) disease. The more you smoke, the greater your risk. Did you know that nicotine and carbon monoxide from cigarettes have a significant effect on your heart and blood vessels? When you smoke, your heart rate increases and your blood pressure rises. At the same time, your arteries narrow and blood flow decreases.



Giving up smoking – what are the real benefits?

Your risk of heart disease begins to decrease almost immediately after you stop smoking.

In 20 minutes: your blood pressure and heart rate fall to their normal level.

In eight hours: your level of oxygen rises to its normal rate and your carbon dioxide level drops.

In 24 hours: your chance of a heart attack starts to go down.

In 12 months: your risk of a heart attack falls by more than 50%.

After several years: your risk of heart disease could be similar to that of someone who has never smoked at all.

Asthma — a global problem

Asthma is a chronic respiratory disease. The symptoms are a 'tight', chest, coughing, wheezing and difficulty in breathing. When a person with asthma comes into contact with something that irritates their airways, the lining of the bronchial tubes starts to swell. This makes the airways narrower and it is more difficult for air to get in and out of the lungs. Sometimes mucus is also produced. All of these cause the patient to wheeze, cough and become breathless.

- Asthma is the most common chronic disease among children.
- Asthma is a major public health problem for many countries in the world.
- The country with the highest level of asthma is the United Kingdom, followed by New Zealand.
- Over 80% of asthma deaths happen in low and lower-middle income countries.
- The causes of asthma are not completely understood. It is hereditary (it runs in family and is passed from parent to child) and is linked with allergies. Things that cause allergic reactions include:
 - indoor allergens (e.g. dust, pet hair)
 chemicals in the workplace
 - outdoor allergens (e.g. pollens)
 air pollution.
 - tobacco smoke

Although there is no cure for asthma, it is possible to control the symptoms and enjoy a good quality of life.

What is a food allergy?

Causes and symptoms

Any food can cause an allergic reaction. However, 90% of all reactions are caused by the following eight foods: fish and shellfish, peanuts, milk, eggs, wheat, nuts and soy.

Food allergy symptoms generally appear within a few minutes or up to two hours after eating one of these foods. Symptoms include minor reactions such as a tingling sensation in the mouth, a rash and swelling, or eczema, abdominal cramps, diarrhoea, or vomiting. More serious reactions could be swelling of the tongue and throat, wheezing, breathing difficulties, or a decrease in blood pressure. Loss of consciousness is also possible and even death, although this is very rare.

If you have any of these symptoms after eating, tell your doctor, even if the symptoms are mild or disappear within a few minutes.

Diabetes

Diabetes mellitus (sometimes called sugar diabetes) is a condition that occurs when the body can't process glucose properly and has very high blood sugar. Glucose is sugar that the body uses for energy and it is normally controlled by a hormone called insulin. Insulin is produced by the pancreas and if a person has diabetes this is either because the pancreas does not make enough insulin (Type 1 diabetes) or the body can't respond normally to the insulin that is made (Type 2 diabetes). A level of blood sugar produces the classic diabetes symptoms of needing to urinate very often, feeling thirsty and losing weight. However, it is very common for overweight people to get diabetes so the condition is linked to obesity. Patients with Type 1 diabetes can control the condition with insulin and patients with Type 2 diabetes can control it with diet and exercise.

Diarrhoea

The definition of diarrhoea is when a person passes three or more loose or liquid stools per day. It is a common condition which most people suffer from at some time in their lives. Diarrhoea is a result of an infection in the intestine, which can be caused by bacteria, a virus, or some kind of parasite. In developed countries, an episode of diarrhoea is usually not very difficult to control and is not usually considered dangerous. In developing countries, however, diarrhoeal disease is one of the main causes of child mortality. In children under five years old, diarrhoeal disease is the second main cause of death – second only to pneumonia.

Because most cases of diarrhoea are caused by viruses, it's not usually possible to use antibiotics to treat them. Diarrhoea caused by bacteria will usually go away in a few days even without antibiotics. In fact, the most dangerous thing about diarrhoea is that it causes a patient to become dehydrated. A person suffering from diarrhoea quickly loses lots of water and electrolytes (sodium, chloride, potassium and bicarbonate) – the essential chemicals that allow the body to work. If the lost fluid and electrolytes are not replaced, the patient becomes dehydrated.

There are three stages of dehydration:

1 Early dehydration

- the patient is thirsty and may have a headache
- 2 Moderate dehydration
 - the patient is very thirsty
 - the patient is restless or irritable
 - the patient's skin becomes less elastic
 - the patient's eyes are sunken

3 Severe dehydration

- the patients' symptoms become more severe
- The patient goes into shock, the skin is pale and damp, the pulse is rapid and weak, blood pressure is very low

Severe dehydration can result in death if body fluids and electrolytes are not replaced. In developing countries, children who die from diarrhoea often also suffer from malnutrition, which makes them weak so it is easier for them to get diarrhoea. However, each time they get diarrhoea, it makes their malnutrition even worse. It is not surprising, therefore, that diarrhoea is one of the main causes of malnutrition in children under five years old.

After you are discharged you may be living at home or in another setting. It is important to know where to find care and also to know who will help you after your discharge from hospital.

It is important to understand your prescription drugs – when to take them and what side effects you might experience. Ask for the name and number of the person to call in case you have any questions. Tell the hospital staff about the medication you took before coming to hospital. This includes over-the-counter drugs and prescription drugs as well as any supplements. Ask if you can still take them after your discharge.

It is important to know what medical equipment, e.g. walking stick, you will need to use after your discharge. You may have some questions about this after you leave hospital, so ask for the name and number of the person to call.

If you eat canned fruit at home, then eight segments of grapefruit is considered a portion, for example. And for dried fruit – try one tablespoon of raisins or two figs. A medium glass of fruit juice or a small carton – that's 150 ml – counts as one portion.

Portions of vegetables are a little more difficult to count. If you like salads – then three sticks of celery counts as one

portion. Three tablespoons of cooked, canned or frozen vegetables is also one portion.

So far so good. Now for the bad news. I'm sure there are a lot of you who like chips or a packet of crisps in front of your favourite film – me too. Sorry to say that potato and other starchy vegetables, like yams, cannot be included in the five a day.

Finally, be careful of ready-meals and takeaways. They may contain vegetables but they are also high in salt and sugar. And even if you think they include lots of different vegetables, they only count as one portion!

 - C: None at all, no.
 - N: Ah, well that's good. Listen, I'll ask the doctor to prescribe you some laxatives. Try to drink more water and we can talk about diet later.



I work for a medical charity and at the moment I'm working in a refugee camp in North East Africa. It's not an easy place to be. The camp was made to for about 1,000 people, but there is more than than twice that number. We don't have enough clean water and there are problems with outbreaks of sickness and diarrohea. As you know infection is spread through dirty drinking water and that was one of the biggest problems here at the beginning. The most important thing in treating diarrhoea is to rehydate the patient. A severely dehydrated patient needs rehydration with intravenous fluids. They go into the hospital here and have an intravenous drip. For moderate dehydration, it is possible to treat a patient effectively with oral rehydration salts or ORS. We have saved a lot of lives, particularly children's lives with this. ORS is a mixture of clean water, salt and sugar which is very easy to prepare even here where we have such limited medical facilities. It's very cheap, which is also important. As I often have to explain, ORS does not stop the diarrhoea but it stops the dangerous dehydration caused by the diarrhoea. It is absorbed in the small intestine and replaces the water and electrolytes lost in the faeces.

Unit 8 Patient discharge

Jim broke his leg in a skiing accident. He doesn't really remember what happened. It was a bad fall and he broke his leg in two places. It's still in plaster so it's not easy for him to walk. He's using crutches to help get around.

Mrs Ridley has had a hip operation. It was successful, but she needs time to get better and recover her strength. She's 78 and rather frail. She can't walk very far, so she uses a wheelchair when she goes out. Her husband is strong enough to push her.

Elin is an artist. She fell off a ladder when she was working on a big wall painting and hurt her back. She was completely paralysed for awhile. She's had a lot of physiotherapy and has recovered her mobility more than we thought was possible. She needs to wear a leg brace because her right leg was badly damaged and she uses a walking stick to help her get around.

Mr Aziz has arthritis in his legs. He's been in hospital for some drug treatment, to which he responded well. His knees are still quite painful, however, and he can't get around very quickly. He uses a walking frame to give him some support when he's out by himself.

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[N = Nurse; R = Mr Ridley]

- 1 N: Your wife is very frail, Mr Ridley and she's going to need help with going to the toilet, for example.
 - R: Yes, I realize that. But it's going to be difficult for me to lift her on and off the toilet.
 - N: Yes. If you get a raised toilet seat, she'll be able to slide from her wheelchair onto the toilet. That'll make it easier for you too.
 - R: Erm, I'll look into it.
- [N = Nurse; A = Arto]
- **2** N: Your sister will need help getting in and out of the bath.
 - A: Yes, I'm a bit worried about that. She'll fall if she's not careful; I know what she's like.
 - N: She could quite easily, yes. It's a good idea to install grab bars around the bath, so she can hold on to them as she gets in and out of the bath. And if she has a non-slip mat, it'll stop her from slipping. Does she have one?
 - A: No.
 - N: I strongly advise you to get one. They're not expensive.
 - A: You're right. If we have time, we'll visit the local DIY store on the way home.
- [N = Nurse; J = Jim]
- 3 N: So, you're leaving tomorrow, Jim. Good news!
 - J: I know. It's too cool!
 - N: So how do you feel about washing and dressing? Do you feel strong enough to do this by yourself today? You need to practice before we discharge you.
 - J: Yeah, sure, why not, I'll give it a go. But if I stand for a long time, I get tired.
 - N: Well, there's a shower chair in the bathroom. Why don't you try taking your shower sitting down today? If you need help, just press the buzzer.

- [N = Nurse; N = Nancy]
- N: So, Nancy, we're going to look at your Discharge Plan together. I'm going to explain what's going to happen and if you have any questions, just ask. OK?

- N: I'm a bit worried about going home, Nurse. I live alone and I'm not sure if I'll manage by myself.
- N: Do you have a friend or family member who could help you, perhaps?
- N: I know my sister will help me if I have problems and maybe my neighbor, if necessary.
- N: That's good. How do you feel about getting to the toilet and getting dressed by yourself?
- N: I think I'll be OK, I've been managing by myself with the toilet and I can get dressed if things are easy to reach.
- N: Could your sister perhaps prepare your clothes for you every evening?
- N: Yes, I suppose she could. What about washing? I'm worried I'll fall if I'm not careful.
- N: Be sure to put a non-slip mat in the shower and maybe a couple of grab bars as well.
- N: Grab bars? What are they?
- N: You put them around the shower and you can hold on to them to stop yourself from slipping.

- N: Yes, that's thing I'm most worried about. If I feel as tired as I am today, I won't have the energy for cooking.

- N: How do you feel about going home today, Nancy?
- N: I was a bit worried yesterday, but I feel better today. It was good to look at the Discharge Plan together.
- N: Good! Now, I just want to talk to you now about your medications, if that's OK. I'm going to give you a list. Your doctor will give you some capsules and some tablets. The capsules are antibiotics. These are very important because they will stop you getting an infection. You need to take two capsules, three times a day at mealtimes.
- N: OK.
- N: The tablets are painkillers. If you're in pain, then take two tablets. But don't take more than two every six hours, and no more than eight tablets a day. There's also a tube of antiseptic ointment. You need to put this on twice a day – in the morning when you get up and at night when you go to bed. Apply it to the area where your stitches are.
- N: Right, is all this written down?
- N: Yes. Don't worry it's all on the list. Oh, and I forgot. It isn't unusual for patients to suffer from constipation after surgery so the doctor has also prescribed a laxative syrup for you.
- N: Oh, good, thank you.
- N: You need to take a tablespoonful three times a day at mealtimes. Can your sister get your medications from the pharmacy for you?
- N: Yes, we can do that on the way home. What's going to happen about my stitches?

N: A home care nurse will be coming to visit you at home the day after tomorrow. She'll change your dressings and make sure you're healing well. Then in ten days you have an appointment in the outpatient clinic. We'll take your stitches out for you then. It's all written down here.
